Johnson had been involved in the Holdrege High School FFA program since his freshman year and won the Nebraska Star Farmer award in 2018. Each state is allowed one candidate for the American Star Farmer award each year. Johnson and his records were competing against the best of the best from each state.

He is currently a senior studying agriculture economics at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He plans to graduate in May and return to Phelps County to farm.

## County's Cattle Population Grows With Phelps Co. Feeders Expansion

Phelps County Feeders recently began an expansion project that will add 8,000 cattle and will bring 10 new employees to the county.

After the 2021 harvest, Phelps County Feeders began moving dirt for the project, which includes adding 40-50 pens of cattle on about 65 acres. It will increase its cattle on feed from 42,000 to 50,000. A new loading dock and processing dock will also be built at the business's main feedlot at 73938 J Road. It also has a "west" feed yard north of Bertrand.

This is good news for area farmers as the feedlot will need more crops to feed the variety of cattle raised at the business.

Phelps County Feeders raises its own cattle and also feeds cattle

for clients across the United States and Canada. The feed yard is often at maximum capacity with its clients and needs more space.

Phelps County Feeders co-owner Dale Klute said he believes the decrease in family-owned farms and ranches has created a need for expanded pen space in commercial yards. Also, the demand for beef has increased nationwide. According to AgWeb, consumer and wholesale beef demand have hit a 30-year high despite record beef prices.

### Nebraska Star Beef

The feedlot is owned by the Dale and Shawna Klute family and the Tony Mayes family. They also operate Nebraska Star Beef, a direct-to-consumer beef products business that has also grown in the

past several years. Phelps County Feeders raises and supplies the all-natural and conventional beef for Nebraska Star Beef.

Kayla Pfister, a partner in Nebraska Star Beef, said that only a small percentage of cattle go to Nebraska Star Beef. The rest of Phelps County Feeders cattle are sold to various packing facilities around the Midwest, depending on the end-use. The business raises a variety of cattle including conventional cattle, Piedmontese, Wagyu and many others. Each breed is on a different feeding program and is shipped to a different end-user.

Pfister said the 2020 pandemic shutdown created a unique

The award is given annually to someone who has gone above and beyond the call of duty in economic development.

PCDC President Phil Hinrichs selected Harrel for his leadership and vision in economic development work the past year.

"He has been a good advocate for us," Hinrichs said. "And his involvement has been critical to some of the projects PCDC has been working on."

Harrel has served as the CEO of Phelps Memorial Health Center since 2007. He's led several hospital expansion projects, and PMHC has been recognized as a top critical-access hospital by The Chartis Center for Rural Health for five years in a row.

The hospital provides hundreds of well-paying jobs. Gallup named PMHC an Exceptional Workplace for the second consecutive year in 2021.

Under Harrel's leadership, the hospital

expanded its capacity to serve the area by bringing in new doctors, services and visiting specialists thus improving the quality of life for the region's residents. He and his leadership team, including Loren Shroder, CFO, were instrumental in creating RuralMED, a diversified provider of home health and medical management services.

"Having a great hospital in a community is a key to its success and growth," Hinrichs said. "Mark's leadership has made our community a better and safer place to live and has improved our efforts to attract and retain businesses."

PMHC also received the Huron Excellence in Healthcare Award in 2021, and Harrel was named the 2017 CEO of the Year & Best Overall Performance for Critical Access Hospitals by Quorum Health Resources.

Harrel's leadership has also guided the creation of Adjacent Properties LLC, which is investing in community improvement projects, such as residential property and the renovation of the Sun Theater, with more projects in the planning stages.

"Mark has been a quiet community leader on many important economic development projects," Hinrichs said. "We appreciate his guidance and his passion for community betterment in Phelps County. His contributions are indeed, priceless."

# PCDC Celebrates \$1 Million Campaign

Investors have pledged more than \$1 million to help GROW 37 by supporting the work of the Phelps County Development Corporation over the next five years.

More than 100 investors pledged to support PCDC's work from 2022 to 2026 as part of the GROW37 Partnership Campaign.

"We are grateful to all of our investors for their confidence in PCDC and their generous financial support to help create a vibrant local economy," PCDC Executive Director Ron Tillery said.

The campaign, which started in early 2021 and wrapped up at the end of the year, is part of the funding mechanism for an aggressive five-year strategic plan that focuses on four key areas:

**Recruit Targeted Industries:** Make Iron Horse Business & Industry Park shovel ready, attract new businesses and manufacturers, provide grants for new franchises, continue a retail recruitment partnership.

**Support Current Businesses:** Assist in workforce recruitment and training, continue

high-demand jobs scholarships, support DREAM grants.

**Improve the Quality of Life:** Complete the new CREW subdivision, create more workforce housing, build an attractive events center, recruit restaurants and retailers, create thriving downtowns.

**Create a Strong Brand:** Expand PCDC communication lists, be a leader in economic development circles.

While LB840 sales tax funds support PCDC's projects, the investor funds pay for administrative expenses so that sales tax funds can be funneled directly to programs for local economic development.

Before launching the campaign, PCDC conducted a feasibility study to gauge investor confidence in the organization. Of the 30 investors interviewed, 99 percent rated PCDC's image as good or very good, and 100 percent rated the local economy as good or very good.

Investors said that "PCDC is supportive and

drives innovation in the community" and "adds energy to the community."

When potential investors were asked about their dreams for the community, answers included more restaurants and clothing stores, added manufacturing, a more visually vibrant community, a vibrant downtown with more retail, added retail in general, quality affordable housing, an event center, an expanded CCC campus, completed baseball complex, and a hike/bike trail.

Interviewees were also asked to share major issues facing Phelps County. Challenges listed included workforce recruitment, lack of affordable housing, increasing construction costs, vacant downtown buildings, and lack of IT services as remote working grows in popularity.

PCDC conducted similar campaigns in 2011 and 2016, which both resulted in approximately \$1 million in investor funds as well. However, PCDC drove down 2021 campaign expenses to less than a third of the previous campaigns by using local resources.

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opportunity for Nebraska Star Beef, and the company reached the \$3 million sales mark for the first time that year. Its most popular products are ribeye steaks and ground beef. And, Californians, are feasting on Phelps County-raised beef as it was the most popular shipping destination for Nebraska Star Beef products in 2020.

"With the pandemic, we were able to supply a lot of ground beef," Pfister said. "We got some good reviews and positive feedback. They were able to try our product, and demand continues to grow through word of mouth."

Nebraska Star Beef is also eyeing an expansion in the coming year as it needs more freezer space.

In addition to all-natural beef products, Nebraska Star Beef also produces Lucky Brand beef jerky and seasonings that are also shipped to consumers across the United States.

The family also owns Angus Burgers & Shakes in Kearney and Gretna and Joy's Table in Kearney and provides all of the beef and steak for all three restaurants.

Pfister said Nebraska Star Beef and Phelps County Feeders employ 50 people

between the two companies.

"We are pretty thankful for the crew we have," she said. "Several have been with us for a long time."

With the expansion, they will need to hire 10 more employees, including pen riders, feed-truck drivers and processing workers.

Weather permitting, they are hoping the project will be complete by late spring or early summer of 2022.

Pfister said a few of the reasons Nebraska Star Beef and Phelps County Feeders have been successful are due to their great customer service and their family-centered operations.

"We care about the service we provide, and we try to make sure we provide good customer service to our clients. We care about what we do. The family aspect of it helps, too."

In addition to Pfister and her parents (Dale and Shawna), other family members in the business include Kayla's four brothers (Joe, Derek, Chandler, Todd), a sister (Kelsey), two sisters-in-law (Becky and Katie), a cousin (Steve) and an uncle (Dan).

## RECRUITING QUALITY TALENT

### Applications Due Feb. 15 for HD Jobs Scholarships

Applications are due Feb. 15 for Phelps County high-demand jobs scholarships.

The High-Demand Jobs Scholarships are part of PCDC's efforts to create a quality local workforce.

Scholarship winners must sign a contract stating their intention to return to Phelps County and work for a certain amount of time after their higher education. The scholarships are funded through LB840 sales tax funds, private donors and matching funds from the Phelps County Community Foundation.

The scholarships are intended to encourage graduating seniors and non-traditional students to pursue work in local high-demand jobs: nursing, agri-business and technology positions, auto and diesel mechanics, engineer technologists, mechatronics engineers, injection mold technicians, electro-mechanical technologists, machinists, tool and die makers, construction trades, welders and commercial truck drivers.

In the eight years the scholarships have been offered, \$200,500 has been awarded to more than 77 students.

After graduating from Holdrege High School, Colter earned a degree in general automotive at Southeast Community College in Milford. He then worked at a local automotive business for five years before launching his business on Nov. 17, 2021.
