That investment is now benefiting Holdrege residents and businesses and giving Phelps County a boost in economic development efforts.

"We recognized the community's need for a robust telecommunications infrastructure. something the other providers have overlooked. Our investment in fiber demonstrates our belief in the potential of Holdrege and our dedication to supporting the residents, businesses, schools, and healthcare providers with the tools they need to thrive. Glenwood has invested over \$10 million in Phelps County as a whole."

Two years ago, Glenwood announced its plans to add infrastructure to make high-speed fiber internet available to every

## Phelps County Fair to Host New Foundation's Launch Event

The Phelps County Ag Society, with sponsorship from the new foundation, will present the first Bares and Bulls Bash on Tuesday, July 22, at the fair. The event will feature a bull ride, bareback riding, kids' mutton bustin, fireworks, and live music. It will kick off with the singing of the national anthem as the American flag is delivered to the arena by Paradise Skydiving.

Julie Bushell, founder of the Rural Frontier Foundation, spent many hours in Phelps County over the past year working on various projects for PCDC.

"After spending so much time in Phelps County, it has become abundantly clear the community represents the very best of rural America," Bushell said. "The willingness to support each other, the investment of time, money, and resources to make the community the very best it can be, and the willingness to sit at the table to execute on a vision for the next generation of Phelps County citizens has been both inspiring and reinforces what makes America great. Phelps County represents everything America should be: a frontier spirit, grit, determination, and controlling your own destiny." In addition to local marketing efforts by the Phelps County Agricultural Society, Bushell will be marketing the event across the state from Omaha to Scottsbluff.

"We hope urbanites attend, those interested in supporting rural Nebraska, and those who want to join us in celebrating and supporting agriculture," Bushell said.

She is hoping the event provides an opportunity to meet farmers interested in participating in short commercials highlighting ag operations, the farm lifestyle and the value each brings to the nation.

"We would like to interview farmers, capture the authenticity of an event like the rodeo, and create short commercials for national media," Bushell said.

In addition to the Rural Frontier Foundation, several other local sponsors are making the event possible.

## USDA Approves Solar Project for Iron Horse Business & Industry Park

The U.S. Department of Agriculture in May approved PCDC's application to proceed with the Iron Horse Solar project, a proposed 11-acre solar farm to be built on undevelopable land in the Iron Horse Business & Industry Park west of Holdrege.

"Initially, we were simply looking for a way to maximize the use of our property, and this parcel couldn't be developed for other purposes," PCDC Executive Director Ron Tillery said. "After exploring the options for this site, we came to the conclusion that potential for adding solar energy generation was a good fit, and it would enhance the appeal of PCDC's industrial park."

Tillery said that inflation will drive up the cost of power over time, but once the electricity rate is established with this solar farm, rates will be frozen for 30 years. PCDC plans to sell electricity generated from Iron Horse Solar to the City of Holdrege at or below the price the city pays to NPPD for power. An NPPD policy limits the amount of power the city can purchase to 10 percent of its total daily community demand from the solar farm, or about 2.5 megawatts.

In addition to helping with local electricity demand, the Iron Horse Solar farm will generate renewable energy credits, which are attractive to corporations interested in achieving net-zero emissions of greenhouse gases. Purchasing energy credits generated by solar farms helps companies comply with environmental regulations.

"What we hope to do is leverage PCDC's work to develop the system to enhance our capability as an economic development organization; the system is attractive to a broad range of potential buyers once it's completed," Tillery said.

Tillery said the solar farm will cost an estimated \$4.5 million, and PCDC has applied

for and secured a low-interest loan through the USDA's Rural Utility Service to help fund the project. The interest could be as low as 0 percent on the loan, and 20 percent of the loan is forgivable once the "switch is flipped on." The operating entity will have an immediate equity position in the project, a very attractive proposition."

PCDC has partnered with Olsson on project civil engineering and GenPro Energy Solutions of Piedmont, SD, on design and technical engineering of the solar farm. GenPro works with businesses, municipalities, utilities, and government entities on energy-efficient lighting systems and utility-grade solar energy farms.

Molly Brown, GenPro's Developer on the Phelps County project, said GenPro has pioneered municipal solar in Nebraska starting with the first municipal utility solar project for the City of Lexington.

"Our work is primarily with other NPPD wholesale communities similar to Holdrege including Cozad, Gothenburg, Central City, Wahoo, Schuyler and others," Brown said.

Solar projects benefit cities by providing energy and reducing transmission and capacity charges. It also helps with economic development.

"For economic development, communities are using solar production to attract new businesses," Brown said. "Many corporations have sustainability goals, and whether a community has adopted renewable energy can determine where they decide to bring their business."

GenPro is currently still working through the application process with the USDA's PACE program. Iron Horse Solar will be located on 11 acres near the gateway to the Iron Horse Business & Industry Park near 11th Avenue and Gustin Street.

## Sweet Summer Starts With Funky Monkey

Ronda and Terry Booth of Holdrege spent years dreaming about a retirement gig operating a shaved ice business. Their dream is coming true with the opening of Funky Monkey Shaved Ice & More LLC, a new business offering sweet and icy treats just in time for summer.

The shaved ice stand officially opened on May 5 across from the former Dairy Queen location near 4th Avenue and Hancock. "It's in the old Paul's Derby lot," Ronda said, for those longtime Holdrege residents who remember the iconic gas station and gaming store.

Ronda, a 1984 Holdrege High School graduate, previously worked in the grocery store deli/ bakery business, so she has a background in food service. Terry works at Union Pacific Railroad and helps as needed in the business.

"This is something that really means a lot to us," Ronda said. "I remember growing up here, going to the swimming pool, and stopping to get ice cream. We wanted to create something like that for the next generation."

This spring, the Booths decided to take the leap into their business venture. They found a trailer in Colorado and redecorated the trailer's exterior to feature a monkey in sunglasses with bursts of bright blue and hot pink.

Funky Monkey serves 31 flavors of shaved ice along with slushies, iced coffee, iced tea, cookies, and Rice Krispies bars. Hours are noon to 8 p.m. daily, with occasional changes in days or hours for special events. The Booths are also

hitting the road for festivals and gatherings, with many events already lined up. They are hopeful for an appearance at the Nebraska State Fair.

The most popular flavors so far have been blue raspberry, cotton candy, and tiger's blood. Their signature Funky Rootbeer Float is a one-of-akind treat with ice cream in the bottom, layered with shaved ice, topped with a "snow cap" made from sweetened condensed milk, evaporated milk, and simple syrup.

"We've served several of them, and people like it so much they keep coming back," Ronda said.

Getting the business up and running wasn't easy or cheap. That's where the Phelps County Development Corporation (PCDC) stepped in. With encouragement from Gayleen Mauer at Bruning State Bank, the Booths applied for and received PCDC GO! BUSINESS grants to help with startup costs.

"I need to thank everyone who has been involved in this, including PCDC and the customers who have supported us," Ronda said. "It's been phenomenal. I can't wait to see where this takes us."

address in Holdrege. That project was completed on time in mid-2024. Since then, the company has been in the subscriber connection phase, activating new service daily.

Glenwood's investment in Phelps County is good for economic development efforts.

"Reliable, high-speed fiber connectivity is a foundational driver of economic development, and its impact in Phelps County will be farreaching," Rouse said. "Businesses, both existing and new, can now operate with greater efficiency, adopt cloud-based tools, expand their online presence, and compete in broader markets. For entrepreneurs and remote workers, access to fiber removes a major barrier to locating or staying in a rural area."

The new service also strengthens essential services like healthcare and education by enabling telehealth, virtual learning, and dataintensive applications. "And most importantly, it makes the county more attractive to families, professionals, and employers who increasingly see reliable broadband as a basic requirement just like electricity or water," Rouse said.

#### **Community Response & Growth**

The Holdrege community has embraced the project with enthusiasm.

"The response from the Holdrege community has been positive, and Glenwood is grateful for the support we've received," Rouse said. "From day one, residents and businesses have shown interest in having a local provider bring fast, reliable fiber service to their community. That trust has translated into steady customer growth since we began offering service in Holdrege."

Rouse said remote workers in Holdrege have said Glenwood's new fiber broadband has improved their daily work routines.

"Many have shared that switching to fiber has eliminated issues with downtime, buffering, and slow upload speeds during video calls and file transfers," Rouse said.

Also, residents and business owners have reported peace of mind knowing they have a reliable connection.

"These personal accounts, where improved internet experience translates to reduced stress and increased productivity, affirm the value of our efforts," Rouse said.

#### **Powered by Partnership**

Local partnerships were vital to the project's success. The City of Holdrege and Phelps County worked closely with Glenwood on permitting and public right-of-way access, minimizing disruption and streamlining progress. PCDC's support and local insight helped Glenwood tailor services to meet the community's needs.

"Additionally, PCDC has been a strong and consistent partner from day one," Rouse said. "The PCDC staff's guidance, local knowledge, and introductions to area businesses have been invaluable in helping us build meaningful relationships within the community."

Holdrege's newest mural was completed at the end of May on the north side of the Holdrege Eagles Club at 223 West Ave.

Stevenson started painting the mural in late April and was assisted by her former art student, Hallie J. Snyder, and Bertrand art teacher Scott Schwarz.

"I am so thrilled and honored to have the opportunity to create the largest mural and work of art in my life and in my hometown of Holdrege that I dearly love," said Stevenson, a 1991 Holdrege High School graduate. "I personally have to thank Mark Beam and the Eagles Club for chasing down this dream for me."

Stevenson is a professional artist/illustrator/ muralist and instructor who lives in Ojai, Calif. She has taught at the ESU 11's Summer Honors program in Holdrege for several years. She also taught painting classes at Central Community College while in Holdrege for the mural painting.

The mural project was funded by grants from PCDC, the Phelps County Visitors Committee, and Eagles club donors. One of PCDC's priorities is

creating more vibrant downtowns, and murals are one way to do that.

Stevenson and the other artists were grateful to the local residents who stopped by to watch the mural progress and who attended the Meet the Muralists event once the mural was completed.

## **CCC Begins Project to Relocate to Downtown Holdrege**

Construction has started on a major renovation to transform a former bank building in downtown Holdrege into a new space for Central Community College.

CCC officials announced in March plans to relocate from the Phelps County Agricultural Society building, where it has been housed for 26 years, to downtown Holdrege. The college will now lease space from BoSox 7 LLC, which purchased the former Great Western Bank building at 424 West Ave.

The CCC Board of Governors approved spending \$1.9 million to relocate the college. Once completed, the 11,300-square-foot space will feature classrooms, live video rooms, a nursing assistant lab, a computer lab, offices, and a testing room.

"We greatly appreciate the decades of partnership with the Phelps County Agricultural Society but look forward to this expanded space to offer even more CCC services and programming to attract and enhance the lives of area residents," CCC President Dr. Matt Gotshall said.

Gotshall said CCC has worked with more than 540 students in the past year at the Holdrege center and is seeing growing enrollment and growth in the number of credit hours taken.

"We anticipate those numbers to increase due to expanded offerings and the increased visibility of our center and interactions downtown," Gotschall said.

CCC is planning to expand offerings in allied health, computer programming, and mechatronics while also exploring additional

English language learning, adult education, youth programming, and small-business development.

Sampson Construction is serving as the general contractor for the project and will coordinate with local and state subcontractors.

CCC hosted a construction kickoff event on May 20. The project is expected to be completed by the end of the year with students attending classes in the new space in January.

PCDC helped spur the college's relocation by setting up meetings between CCC and the building's new owners.

"We love the idea of having the facilities downtown and expanded programming available for students," said PCDC Executive Director Ron Tillery.

PCDC provides partial funding for CCC's nursing assistant classes and for the Janssen Auto Tech class conducted at Janssen locations.

The Phelps County Ag Society now has more than 4,000 square feet of space available to lease starting in January. Contact the Ag Center staff at (308) 999-1169 for details.



"We didn't know what to do with the space, and RV parking came up because the one up by Elm Creek is always full," McQuillan said.

The only other campground in Holdrege is the cityoperated space, which is \$10 daily for a maximum of five days.

"I lead with relaxation, and gently guide you into a calm, focused state known as hypnosis. You are still aware throughout the process, just deeply relaxed."

Vig first investigated hypnotherapy after feeling stuck and carrying stress. She started looking into ways to change her life and found hypnotherapy.

"I was skeptical at first, like many are with things involving the mind," Vig said. "Once I did some research, I tried it, and it helped me shift those deep, heavy stories and limiting beliefs. Now, I aim to give back and help others just like me." Vig wants to reassure clients that it's OK to fear the idea of hypnotherapy. She encourages clients to come and try it out before making any assumptions.

"You don't have to have it all figured out - just show up and be open to the idea of change," Vig said. "I work with a lot of people who are struggling with stress, anxiety, or confidence. Hypnotherapy is very flexible, and it can help with insomnia and fear of failure and bring relief and clarity."

## Sun Theater Expansion Begins

The Holdrege Sun Theater is expanding into space south of its current location to accommodate more guests and a second movie screen.

"One of the biggest reasons we decided to pursue the expansion is to really open up the opportunity for our guests to have movie options," said Jaimee Anderson, Director of Operations for Adjacent Properties, who is facilitating the expansion. "We want to offer some additional movies and entertainment types to the community and host a lot of events, but to host the events, we would have to shut down the movie for the night. With this expansion, we would be able to have the separate spaces."

This expansion will create more room for the theater to host graduation and birthday parties, as well as other community events. It will boast a retractable movie screen with comfortable, individual seating, and a kitchenette and bar area for hosting.

"It's kind of cool to have one space for a smaller,



more intimate feel, and one space with traditional movie theater seating," Anderson said. "You will be seeing movies that have been out for a week or two in this space to free up the main theater for those bigger showtimes."

Demolition on the project has already started, and the expansion is expected to be completed by the end of 2025.

"We want to preserve the beauty of the building, so we are being very delicate with the process," Anderson said. "We have wanted to do this for years, and it finally makes sense to, thanks to some great community support in 2024."
