RETAINING A QUALITY WORKFORCE Taking Action to Help BD Employees

When BD announced the relocation of its needle and syringe manufacturing lines to other areas, resulting in the loss of more than 100 local jobs, PCDC and the Holdrege Area Chamber of Commerce stepped up to help.

PCDC and HACC cooperated to plan a regional hiring event with more than 40 employers on Sept. 20 at the Holdrege High School.

PCDC and HACC conducted group and personal meetings with BD employees and managers and brought in the Nebraska Department of Labor Rapid Response Team. In partnership with BD managers, resume and mock interview trainings were also coordinated for affected BD employees. "We want to help people whose lives are connected in Holdrege to stay in the community if they choose," HACC of Commerce Chief Executive Officer Lori Larson said. "We want to look out for their economic well-being."

The decision affects approximately 109 positions in Holdrege that will be transitioned elsewhere after Oct. 20.

"Our goal was to have everyone employed on Oct. 21 when they become eligible for employment," PCDC Executive Director Ron Tillery said. "We hope to connect those people to their next career. There are many quality positions available in our community."

PCDC and HACC encouraged

local business owners to share any current job openings, which resulted in 80 job postings on the HACC website in late August.

Employers who post job openings at NEworks.com and hire a displaced BD employee can receive up to a \$7,000 training grant through the DOL for each employee hired.

Some of the impacted employees may take this opportunity to start a new business, and Tillery said he has already heard of one employee planning to do so. PCDC has tools, trainings and financial resources to help with business start-ups.

New Partnership Aims to Recruit Retailers & Restaurants to County

For business owners looking to expand their current offerings or entrepreneurs seeking information about opening a new business, PCDC's new partnership with The Retail Coach will be beneficial. The new retail and restaurant recruitment partner's in-depth research provides vital information on potential future growth and sales opportunities.

For the past few months, The Retail Coach has been collecting data on the Phelps County market. That information will be translated into marketing materials to be shared with targeted retailers. It is also posted to PCDC's website.

Becky Gross, Project Manager with The Retail Coach, visited Holdrege in September and shared many of the statistics they have collected so far, met with business owners, and viewed potential development sites.

The Retail Coach uses cell phone data to track consumer shopping patterns in the area. They determined that Holdrege's Primary Retail Trade Area extends to Elwood, Arapahoe and Beaver City to the west, Minden and Franklin to the east and Alma, Republican City, Orleans and Stamford to the south for a total population of 21,532.

The demographic report shows the following statistics:

- Average county household income: \$82,221
- Average county age: 41
- Average county household size: 2.4
- Median county owner-occupied housing

• 11% of Holdrege is of Swedish ancestry, while 23% is of German ancestry.

The Trade Area Retail Demand Outlook report shows the actual demand for retail and restaurant products and services in 2023 and the projected growth in demand in five years.

The highest retail demand in the trade area is for automobile and parts sales with \$48 million demand in 2023. That is expected to grow by another \$4 million by 2028.

The report shows the following other retail demands in the trade area:

• \$28.6 million demand for grocery stores, growing 2 percent over 5 years

- \$7.2 million, clothing stores
- \$3.6 million, sporting goods
- \$26.5 million, general merchandise
- \$24.6 million, food and beverages

met with BD employees in three group meetings in late August at the plant. Tillery said Kissinger encouraged the affected employees to have confidence in their skills moving forward. BD's strong reputation will bode well for its employees seeking future employment with other companies.

Tillery said BD has helped many employees purchase homes in Phelps County through PCDC's GO! HOME downpayment matching grant program. PCDC will continue to offer that incentive to qualified BD employees even without an employer match.

At this time, it's unclear what will happen with the BD facility in west Holdrege, which recently completed a reported \$33 million renovation. Tillery said if the facility becomes available, PCDC will actively recruit another business to fill the space, which is set up nicely for any medical device manufacturer. Since the building is not landlocked, it has the potential for expansion.

BD will continue to have a smaller presence in Holdrege with its medical device sterilization and microbiology lab services. Many former BD employees are already working for embecta, which employs more than 500 locally.

"We are grateful for the 57 years that BD has been a part of Holdrege," Tillery said. "It will continue but just a different version of it." **Bertrand**

Ra Ca's food truck features cuisine that mixes the best of Cajun and Mexican flavors.

Courville and Alfaro and their family, which includes six children ranging from age 1 to tenth grade, landed in Holdrege when Willis started a job helping renovate the The Dale Residences. He is an experienced carpenter and roofer.

After living in the community for a while, he and his family realized they loved Holdrege.

"It reminds me of the town my grandma is from," Willis said. "It's a lot slower. The people tend to be a lot nicer. People don't have a mean demeanor. Where we come from people don't talk to people they don't know. Here, they do, and we like that."

His children have connected with others well in Holdrege and have told him they want to stay.

"Everyone is prospering here," he said.

So, he figured Holdrege would be the perfect place to launch his dream business.

Willis said he has been cooking since he was young. As one of six children whose parents often worked on evenings and weekends, he had no choice but to start cooking.

In Holdrege, Willis connected with business start-up resources offered by the Phelps County Development Corporation and the Holdrege Area Chamber of Commerce. And in June of 2023, he served the first food from Ra Ca's food truck.

The entire family pitches in to help with the food truck, and he said business has been better than he expected.

He looks forward to continuing to grow his food business with the motto of "another day of serving good food to great people."

New Gas Station Coming to Loomis

Bridal Isle Expansion, Community Events Bring Momentum to Loomis

"If you are going to serve, then serve. If you are not, don't complain."

That's the wise advice passed onto Keith Fagot of Loomis by his father. It's part of what has prompted Keith to serve the community he has called home for more than 40 years.



Keith recently began serving a term on the Loomis Village Board and is the chairman. He is helping spearhead several exciting projects in the village that will position it for growth in the coming years.

"The most exciting thing that we have been working very hard for the

past year is the convenience store that is going in on the east side of town," Keith said.

Sims' Shop E-Z

Dave and Virginia Sims, formerly of Kearney, sold their Sinclair gas station on Highway 30 in Kearney and are opening a Sinclair station in Loomis. The station will include four dispensers under a canopy, two gasoline and two diesel.

The Loomis location is called Sims' Shop E-Z and will be similar to the Kearney store, which they owned and operated for 38 years.

The building that is already at the location (which was once a restaurant called Idlewild) is being remodeled into a convenience store that will sell coffee, fountain drinks, possibly beer, pizza, hamburgers, cheeseburgers, etc. The business will also continue to sell golf carts.

It is hoped the store and gas station will open by the end of 2023 or early 2024. Dave and Virginia both plan to work at the business and hire four to six part-time employees.

The couple purchased a house in Loomis, and they are looking forward to life in Loomis, where they can drive their golf cart anywhere in town!

PCDC is assisting the project with a business franchise grant, façade improvement grant and digital development grant.

Keith said Loomis residents are excited for this new addition.

"It's quite a big deal for us because we haven't had a gas station like this for a while," he said. "It's another place in town for kids to go after school to get candy and pop."

He said the village has spent the past year preparing for the new business. The village had to annex the property so it could provide sewer services to it and several other businesses in that area. The village also conducted a blight study to offer tax-increment financing for Shop E-Z and for other new businesses that may emerge.

Other Exciting Changes

Keith said individuals have purchased property on the west edge of town that may become a new housing development to add 7-10 homes to the village.

Other projects the village is tackling include enforcing codes on abandoned vehicles and weeds, adding a new sprinkler system to the park and sprinklers and lights at the ballfields.

"We've got plans for the next few years," Keith said. "We are going to try to get things done that have been put off for quite a while."

Keith is also chairman of the Loomis Community Club, which plans community events, such as Turkey Days, Christmas on Commercial, an Easter Egg Hunt and Loomis Days. This year, the club planned a cornhole tournament that attracted 14 teams and a trivia night at The

In downtown Loomis, Bridal Isle is the shining star. Brides-to-be travel from hundreds of miles to find wedding gowns and attire for the entire bridal party, including moms. The store recently completed an expansion that allows for more room to display mother's dresses and to do alterations. PCDC provided a GO! DREAM grant for Bridal Isle's project.

Keith said he enjoys serving Loomis. He sees it as his way to give back to the community that has given him so much. After he retired in 2011, some wondered why he didn't move to a bigger town. And when his wife died in 2021, he received similar questions.

"Why would I move?" he said. "If I need anything, I just make a call and I have 30 people to help me. Small town life is wonderful."

Program Will Help Fill Critical Need for Nursing Assistants

A new nursing assistant class at Central Community College in Holdrege will help fill a critical need for certified nursing assistants and eventually nurses.

Diana Watson, CCC's Regional Director and International Studies Coordinator, said eight high school students are attending the new morning nursing assistant class at CCC this fall. The college has always offered NA classes in the evenings and during the summer. However, this new class allows students to take the class during their school day and potentially earn both high school and college credits at a reduced cost.

"The class gives students a head start on a nursing degree, plus it gives students a chance to work as a CNA and start their careers while pursuing nursing and health science degrees or other educational opportunities," Diana said.

Students learn everything from awareness of elder abuse to hands-on tasks like checking vitals, assisting residents with getting dressed, walking, and other activities of daily living.

Diane Martin, a nurse, is the instructor of the class, which is offered for students who are at least 16 years old from 7:30-8:30 a.m. Mon.-Fri. for one semester. Angie Ekberg assists in teaching the class. At the end of the semester, students can take an exam through the Nebraska Department of Health & Human Services to become a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA).

CNAs are in high demand at local long-term care facilities and at Phelps Memorial Health

Center. It is also a requirement for nursing professionals to first earn this certification.

Laikin Sadd, a senior at Holdrege High School, is one of seven HHS students in the class. One student is from Wilcox Hildreth.

"I work at a nursing home now, and I might want to go into a medical field," Laikin said.

She works as a dietary aide but could double her pay by earning a CNA certification and working in that role. And, the class gives her a head start on any career in the medical field.

Diana said the low price of this class is also an incentive. The class, which normally costs \$452, was reduced to \$221 thanks to state dollars allotted to encourage more high school students to take college classes. PCDC and PMHC are also providing some funding because of the high demand for CNAs and nurses. HHS provides the textbooks for its students in the class, bringing the total cost to just \$65 per student.

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The class is open to high school students 16 or older and was originally offered to all schools in the ESU 11 service area.

CCC is currently training 40 healthcare workers in Holdrege between two NA classes at the Holdrege Center and an EMS class at the Holdrege Fire Department. The next evening NA class starts Oct. 30.

Buettner said he always had considered adding appliance sales and repair to his business, and this was the perfect opportunity.

"The business incorporates with the HVAC and plumbing work I already do," Buettner said. "I thought it would be fitting to add that to my business and keep moving forward."

The two businesses will remain separate with Abramson Appliance remaining at its location at 313 West Avenue. Alpha Heating & Air is located at 206 Grant Street.

In 2021, Abramson Appliance celebrated its 100th year in business under the same family. Buettner purchased the business from third-generation owner Mark Abramson, who purchased the business from his parents (Evald and Mary Lou) in 1991. The business was started by Mark's grandfather G.M. (Gustaf Malcom) in 1921.

Mark Abramson recently celebrated his 70th birthday and said he is ready to slow down as he is experiencing some health issues. He was glad to find a local buyer.

Abramson Appliance sells and services refrigerators, stoves and ovens, dishwashers, microwaves, freezers, washers and dryers. Brands available are Maytag, LG, Speed Queen and KitchenAid.

PCDC assisted the business transition with a gap-financing loan; business and franchise grants for working capital and improvements, initial inventory, employee training and recruitment, and construction and remodeling; and a digital development/marketing grant.

"PCDC was huge in this deal," Buettner said. "It couldn't have happened without them."

Hy-Vee Begins Remodel & Hiring

Remodeling on the highly anticipated new Holdrege Hy-Vee began in early September, and the store is currently hiring managers and full-time staff.

In September, Kaitlyn Janning, Hy-Vee Recruiting Specialist, was seeking a Store Manager, Assistant Manager of Store Operations, Service Manager, Meat Department Manager and Produce Department Manager for the Holdrege store. Those positions are all full-time, and benefits include health, dental and vision insurance after 30 days and a 10 percent Hy-Vee grocery discount. Hy-Vee is also employee owned, and employees can choose to be paid as often as daily.

Janning said those first full-time positions would begin immediately after being hired. Although they prefer employees with experience, they are willing to train the right person.

In the next several months, Holdrege Hy-Vee will hire another six full-time positions for a total of 11 full-time jobs and later approximately 34 part-time positions.

"The excitement for this location in Holdrege is substantial," Janning said, and more employees may be needed after the store opens depending on the sales volume.

Janning, who has worked for Hy-Vee for a decade starting at the Kearney store, is originally from Arapahoe and said that friends and family in

her hometown are also excited to have Hy-Vee closer to home. Many would drive from Arapahoe to Kearney just to shop at Hy-Vee. She said Hy-Vee is seeking to expand into smaller communities like Holdrege to give rural areas more access to better food selection.

An estimated opening date had not yet been announced as of mid-September as they await the remodeling timeframe. Large crews of workers filled the store and parking lot of the Hy-Vee the week of Sept. 11 as remodeling began in full force.

Janning said the store will have meat and produce departments and a deli with a market grill serving hot foods like fried chicken and other meals that community members may request. It will not house a pharmacy.

An outdoor display area with picnic tables and an umbrella is also planned.

Dahl and his daughter, Lori Hunt, purchased the business six years ago. Dahl said they appreciate the community support for the business, and they are excited to create a better experience for their customers.
