Welcome Home Scholarship Recipients!

Several recent Phelps County graduates have returned to the area to begin their careers and finished college nearly debt-free thanks in part to PCDC's high-demand jobs scholarships.

Many of these college graduates connected with their career paths in high school. In addition to high-demand jobs scholarships, some also benefited from employer-reimbursed training programs.

Jory Holt, a 2020 Loomis High School graduate, graduated debt free. He earned a high-demand jobs scholarship in 2020 and participated in the John Deere Tech program, which is helping to pay for the rest of his education. He graduated from Southeast Community College in Milford in May with an associate's degree in diesel technology and is now working at Landmark in Holdrege as a diesel technician.

"I enjoy the people around here, and I like helping them," Jory said. "Landmark is a great company to work with. They are helpful. They don't lead you astray. They will help you in any way possible."

Jory has a three-year contract with Landmark where the company reimburses him monthly for his education at SCC. The PCDC high-demand jobs scholarship helped with the rest.

Jory said he hopes PCDC investors realize the impact they have on kids.

"It really helps out in the long run, and I love that they are trying to help kids come back into Phelps County to help grow the county and just bring people back to where they grew up so we can keep families here," he said.

Jordan Wilbur, a 2020 Holdrege High School graduate, also studied diesel technology at SCC in Milford. He also graduated from the John Deere Tech program in May 2022 and is now working full-time at

Nebraska Diplomats Honor Holdrege With Community of the Year Award

The Nebraska Diplomats honored Holdrege with a Community of the Year award at its annual banquet in Kearney in August.

"The award recognizes the benefits that flow to a community when everyone is pulling an oar, together," PCDC Executive Director Ron Tillery said. "One oarsman just goes around in circles; Holdrege is on a path forward and others are taking notice."

Gov. Pete Ricketts presented the award to Holdrege representatives Ron Tillery and PCDC Board President Phil Hinrichs. Several other PCDC and community representatives also attended the event to celebrate the award.

A Nebraska Department of Economic Development staff member nominated Holdrege for the award.

"Holdrege is an amazing community that is thriving. The community has more than 5,500 residents who are positioning themselves for growth," the awards emcee said.

Apprenticeships Benefit Students, Employers

As Ryan Bowman approached his high school graduation in May 2022, he heard about a mechanic apprenticeship program at BD.

"It sounded good," Bowman said. "Free college, health and dental insurance on top of getting paid to go to college. I like to work with my hands so being an industrial mechanic – that's right where I wanted to be."

Ryan applied for the program and was accepted. A few weeks after graduating from Holdrege High School, he started work at BD in Holdrege working from 7 a.m.-3 p.m. to learn the basics around the Holdrege plant.

This fall, he enrolled at Central Community College in Kearney to earn a certificate as a registered apprentice. BD pays for his college, his time traveling to Kearney and his time in class. He also continues to work at BD as it fits into his schedule around classes.

Bowman said this opportunity in his hometown opens a lot of doors for him.

"I have free schooling," he said. "I am debt free. It's really helped me getting right out of high school and learning how to work and getting my first real job as an adult."

Bethanne Kuck, Site HR Manager at BD, said the apprenticeship program began at BD in 2019. BD spinoff company, embecta, also has the same apprenticeship program. Between the two plants, 10 students have participated, including one this year at BD and four at embecta. To date, no students have completed the program but one will complete it at embecta in December.

Preston Schultheiss also graduated from HHS in 2022 and was hired as an apprentice at embecta. He said this program opens up better opportunities for his future. His goal is to become a senior mechanic.

"This is a very good option for people who wish to go to college and leave debt-free while also learning about machines and how they operate," Schultheiss said. "Thanks to this opportunity, I see myself living a healthy lifestyle and learning more about myself and my job. Without this program, I wouldn't be able to live a happier more flexible lifestyle."

Kuck said the next round of apprenticeship opportunities would be seniors graduating in 2023, and applications will be posted on the company websites when available.

"As long as I can remember, this is what I've wanted to do," Hunter said. "I like just being able to be close to my family and work alongside them and try to build something that I can pass on in the future."

The money he earned from farming in high school and college combined with the PCDC scholarship and other scholarships helped him graduate debt free.

"With the scholarship money I received, I was able to pay for the rest by working and raising cattle," Hunter said. "I just want to thank people for giving to a cause that gets people to come back to our county and help our community grow."

HOUSING UPDATE

Study Shows Need for Hundreds of Homes

Results of a recent Phelps County housing study show a need for between 197-286 new housing units in the next five years.

"This study confirms what we knew intuitively from recent experience: Our market needs more housing for homeowners and renters," PCDC Executive Director Ron Tillery said. "A lot more. The scope is clarified in the report and lays out the challenges we have to fill the current needs as well as our future growth."

Tillery said if the county can come together and respond effectively to the demand laid out in the study, Holdrege and Phelps County will be well positioned to prosper.

"Our area will be able to grow in population and support economic expansion by current and future employers," he said.

To satisfy a medium target demand over five years, the housing study recommended creating the following housing units:

• 197 countywide living units with 128 in Holdrege (57 owner occupied and 71 rentals)

Further breaking down the numbers, the study recommends 16 Holdrege homes in the \$276,200-\$368,000 price range and 27 homes priced above \$372,000. On the rental side, it recommended 24 units priced less than \$805, 15 between \$821 and \$962, 20 between \$1,015 and \$1,230, and 12 at more than \$1,242.

To satisfy a growth demand, the study recommended:

• 286 new units countywide with 206 in Holdrege (83 owner occupied and 110 rentals)

The study reported that Phelps County currently contains "an estimated 4,396 housing units, consisting of approximately 3,096 owner and 1,300 rental units. Of these 4,396 units, approximately 704 are vacant, resulting in an overall, estimated housing vacancy rate of 16 percent."

The study recommended that Phelps County communities upgrade the housing stock during the next five years by both building new homes and rehabilitating (economically feasible) existing housing units.

"Housing units that are severely deteriorated or dilapidated should be targeted for substantial rehabilitation or, in extreme cases, demolition and replacement," the study noted.

Tillery said that one of the challenges to building or rehabbing homes is the bottlenecks that exist in the trades and construction

PCDC Recruits Builders for CREW Homes

More new housing construction will continue soon in the CREW Subdivision in east Holdrege as two companies are finalizing plans to build in the area.

PCDC has been encouraging local builders as well as those across the state to build homes in Holdrege's new CREW subdivision.

Maven Builders of Lincoln is planning to build four homes in CREW similar to homes they built in Lincoln. One of the models will be 1,300 square feet, and the other will be 1,100 square feet.

"We expect Maven to build a total of 12 units in CREW depending on market response to the product," PCDC Executive Director Ron Tillery said.

Maven is still seeking subcontractor bidding, so the construction timeline will

depend on that process. Those interested in purchasing a Maven home prior to construction being complete will have a choice of some finishes. 3-D walk-through videos will soon be available.

The other company planning to build in the CREW subdivision is Heritage Homes of Wayne. Heritage plans to build four 1,176-square-foot homes. They will be 2-bedroom, 2-bathroom homes with a 2-car garage and an unfinished basement.

Heritage Homes are built in the factory in Wayne and are transported and placed on basements. The Heritage homes will likely be completed by March or April 2023. Pre-sale buyers may be able to select some finishes and appliances and can arrange a separate agreement to finish the basement.

"Many contractors are busy and find it difficult to accommodate new projects in a timely fashion," Tillery said. "It may be necessary to import expertise from other markets until we can develop more local capacity. PCDC always encourages developers to use its Builders Bureau of local contractors when bidding jobs, but the scale of our need may exceed the capability of some."

According to the study, three-plus bedroom units at an average purchase price of \$178,000 and an estimated average monthly rent cost of \$640 are the most needed housing types for the workforce population in Phelps County.

The study noted the median age in Phelps

County is 39.7 years, and that is projected to either remain stable or increase in population among persons 55+ years of age.

"It is important that a range of elderly services, amenities and appropriate housing be made available in Phelps County to encourage senior/elderly populations to remain in their respective communities and, ultimately, the county," the study reported.

The study recommended that the City of Holdrege both identify and designate up to 82.5 acres for the future development of "new" housing units by 2027.

County Helps Fund Iron Horse Engineering

Industrial Park One Step Closer to Being Shovel Ready

Final engineering plans are being drawn for the Iron Horse Industrial Park thanks to a boost from American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds.

The Phelps County Board of Commissioners recently approved allocating \$135,000 in ARPA funds to help with this project.

"We've got to be prepared for businesses, and it's difficult to make investments like this in advance, essentially betting on if they come," PCDC Executive Director Ron Tillery said. "When a business is ready to make a decision, we need to be ready. They may not want to wait for a year to complete plans and go through a bid process and construction process when there might be alternatives in other towns. It's a competitive environment out there, and we've got to be able to offer a turn-key deal for businesses."

PCDC has been working with Olsson to prepare the final documents to construct water and sewer infrastructure at the 107-acre industrial park west of Holdrege.

"I compliment the Phelps County Commissioners for taking that proactive position to help PCDC and the county be ready for opportunities," Tillery said.

PCDC has already funded \$83,000 of the cost



of the plans, and the county's funding will take care of the estimated \$135,000 cost to finish engineering plans and prepare the plans for bidding.

Tillery said he hopes that final engineering and

design can be completed in time to schedule bids over the winter and be ready to build during the next construction season.

Road construction in the industrial park would wait until specific projects commit to locating there.

BD Begins Remodel of "Building 2"

BD in Holdrege is giving the former Artistic Woven Labels building a facelift as it prepares to move personnel and some operations into the building.

Plant Manager Jason Sidel said 'Building 2' will house a front office for BD, a mold repair shop, a tool room, several support offices for functional use and a warehouse.

In May 2021, BD announced a new spinoff corporation, which is now called embecta. The new company's focus is on diabetes care while BD continues to produce several medical devices in Holdrege, including injection syringes.

Currently, BD and embecta both operate out of the main BD facility in Holdrege. BD owns

the facility and leases approximately 70 percent of the space to embecta. In Holdrege, more than 500 BD employees have become embecta employees, while BD still employs 180 locally.

Sidel said the former Artistic Woven Labels building will house only BD personnel. BD will maintain a syringe production area, offices, the sterilization operation and the shipping operations at the original site.

This current renovation project includes both interior and exterior work. The parking lot will be located in the front of the building, and BD will install a new monument sign in front.

Sidel said construction is planned to be complete in late 2023.
